

## **NUJS WORKING PAPER SERIES – SUBMISSION GUIDELINES**

### **I GENERAL**

#### **Whom to submit**

All working papers should be submitted in word format as an email attachment to either Mr Daniel Mathew at [danymathew@gmail.com](mailto:danymathew@gmail.com) or to Mr Prabhash Ranjan at [pranjan1278@gmail.com](mailto:pranjan1278@gmail.com).

#### **Who can submit**

All faculty members of NUJS, all doctoral students of NUJS, other visiting fellows, researchers and visitors to NUJS are encouraged to submit their ongoing research work to be published as NUJS Working papers.

#### **Abstract and key words**

All working papers submitted should have an abstract of not more than 300 words with 5 key words.

#### **Cover Page**

The cover page of the paper should include the title of the working paper along with the name of the Author, asterisked, with the author's designation, short bio of not more than 100 words and the email id.

#### **Word limit**

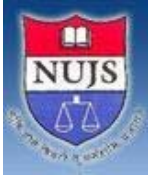
The papers should be in the range of 8-15000 words inclusive of footnotes and bibliography, if any, tables etc.

#### **Copyright**

The author will hold the copyright and not NUJS. NUJS will merely host the author's work.

#### **Peer Review**

All submitted papers will undergo a minimal peer review to make sure that those truly unfit for publication are excluded. This minimal peer review is to make sure that



all papers meet a minimum level of quality. It will not be a very detailed peer reviewing like for journal articles.

### **Presentation**

Oxford English spelling is preferred.

### **Quotations**

Quotations within the text are to be enclosed within single quotation marks, and for quotations within quotations double quotations marks are to be used. If quotations are five lines or more, they should be separated from the rest of the text.

### **Numbers**

In inclusive page numbers, retain the last two digits, but drop other repetitious digits, e.g. 1032-38.

### **Dates**

Day/month/year should be given, thus: 15 March 2005

### **Typestyle: Italics**

Italics should only be used for Latin terms and case names.

## **II FOOTNOTES**

As a general policy footnotes are preferred to endnotes, as they are more reader friendly. They should appear in numerical order.

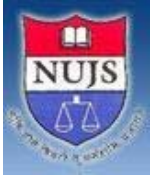
### **Articles**

The order of citation of Journal articles should be:

Author's full name/title of work/volume number/full name of the Journal/first page of the article/(year of publication)/page or pages on which specific material appears.

Arthur E. Appleton, 'Shrimp/Turtle: Untangling the Nets', 2 Journal of International Economic Law 477 (1999), at 479

For a non-consecutively paginated journal like the Journal of World Trade or Economic and Political Weekly, please add the issue number in parentheses after the volume number.



Errol D'Souza, 'The Big Picture: Macroeconomics of Outlays and Outcomes', 40 (10) *Economic and Political Weekly* 921 (2005), at 923.

The order of citation of Newspaper articles should be:

Sheila Page, *Financial Express*, 20 Feb 2005.

### **Books**

References should consist of the author's full name, title (in italic), place of publication, publisher and year of publication (in parentheses) and page numbers.

Lester Thurow, '*The Future of Capitalism*', (London: Nicholas Brealey Publishing 1996) 113.

### **Contribution to Books**

These should be referred to as follows:

Frieder Roessler, 'Diverging Domestic Policies and Multilateral Trade Integration', in Jagdish Bhagwati and Robert Hudec (eds), *Fair Trade and Harmonisation, Prerequisites for Free Trade?*, (Cambridge: MA: MIT Press 1996), Vol. 2, 21-56.

### **References to web sites and other electronic databases**

Web site references must include the essential information: author, title, the location (URL), and the date the source was last visited.

WTO Secretariat, 'Understanding the WTO Agreement on Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS) measures', <http://www.wto.org/wto/goods/spsund.htm> (visited 20 March 2004).

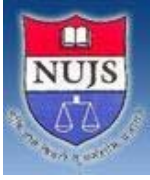
### **Cases**

For Indian cases of Supreme Court and High Court - the standard citation system should be used.

For ICJ cases – follow the system available at <http://www.icj-cij.org/publications/index.php?p1=8>.

For WTO cases - Please cite Appellate Body Reports as follows:

WTO Appellate Body Report, *Australia – Measures Affecting Importation of Salmon (Australia – Salmon)*, WT/DS18/AB/R, adopted 6 November 1998, para 100.



For subsequent reference to this case the following style may be followed

Appellate Body Report, *Australia – Salmon*, above n 20, para 100.

### **Treaties and International Instruments**

General International law treaties must be cited in the following manner

Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), done at Rio de Janeiro, 5 June 1992

WTO agreements should be cited in the following manner

Uruguay Round Agreement on Implementation of Article VI of General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT)

Specific provisions should be cited as follows

Article 4 of the SPS Agreement.

### **Cross-references**

Cross-references within footnotes should normally take the following form

If the reference is to an author the footnote style will be – *See (name of the author), followed by the footnote number*, e.g. *See Sen, Above n 1*. n 1 is the Footnote number (foot note number one). For subsequent references to Sen, the Cross reference will be *Above n 1*

If the reference is to a particular case, the footnote style will be – *See (name of the case), followed by the footnote number*

If the cross reference is to the immediately preceding note, the reference will be:

*Ibid.*

**THESE CITATION GUIDNELINES ARE NOT EXHAUSTIVE AND ARE MEANT TO ACT AS A GUIDE. AUTHORS ARE FREE TO FOLLOW A DIFFERENT STYLE OF FOOTNOTING/ REFERENCING SUCH AS THE SOCIAL SCIENCE CITATION SYSTEM PROVIDED THEY ARE CONSISTENT THROUGHOUT.**
