**8. Report on 3<sup>rd</sup> D.D. Basu Endowment Lecture:**

The 3<sup>rd</sup> D.D. Basu Memorial lecture was organised on 19.01.2010 in the University Auditorium. The lecture was delivered by Hon'ble Dr. Dieter Grimm on **Constitution, Constitutional Courts and Constitutional Interpretation at the Interface of Law and Politics**. Eminent persons, scholars, judges, lawyers, faculty members and students attended the lecture.

**9. Proposal for one year LL.M. Course:**

One year course as already approved by the Academic Council is proposed to be introduced from the academic year 2010-11. The details of the course are as enclosed in Annexure – 5(a).

The UGC and the MHRD have also been informed in this connection, the copies of the letters are Annexed as 5(b).

The LL.M. Degree Course (1 Year)

Objects and Purpose:

This course is designed primarily for foreigners who intend to do one year LL.M course as in most other Universities in the rest of the world. It can also be availed by those Indian nationals who want to improve their academic qualifications or intend to spend a year at the University for refreshing their knowledge of law for their profession, vocation or job but have no desire of taking up teaching job in a University in India for which the current UGC requirement is two year LLM degree course from a University in India.

Requirements for the Course:

Subject to the following the same conditions shall apply to this course as to LLM two year degree course:

1. Admissions shall be made directly and not through CLAT.
2. It shall be a three semester course of one year durations. The first two semesters shall coincide with the LL.M two year course while the third semester shall start after examinations for the second semester are over. It shall end before the start of the next academic year.
3. The course structure shall be as given below:
4. In the first semester a student shall offer Research Methods and any one of the four courses prescribed for the first term and any other two courses from the BA LLB (Hons) courses available in that semester. In the second semester the student may offer any of the four courses prescribed for the BA LLB (Hons) in that semester.

**1. FIRST SEMESTER**

- a) Research Methods (Compulsory)
- b) One from
  - i) Jurisprudence
  - ii) Comparative Constitutional Law
  - iii) Law and Social Transformation
- c) Optional Course
- d) Optional Course

**2. SECOND SEMESTER**

- e) Optional

- g) Optional

h) Optional

Each course shall be of 100 Marks. The mode of examination and distribution of marks in compulsory and optional courses shall be the same as applicable to LLM 2 year course.

### **3. THIRD SEMESTER**

In the third semester the student shall be required to write a thesis of 200 marks. The procedure for approval, supervision etc for the thesis shall be the same as applicable to LLM 2 year course. The requirement of Faculty presentation may however, be waived by the P.G. Council.

Dear Sir,

As you are well aware all universities abroad including the universities in the Asian countries such as Japan, Singapore, Hong Kong have one year LLM course after LLB. Even those Universities, such as London University, which until some years ago had two year LLM course have long changed it to one year course. It is only we who continue to have LLM as a two year course on the pattern of masters course in other disciplines. Legal education is, however, not comparable with other disciplines because of longer duration of LLB course in three as well as five year streams.

In view of longer duration of LLM course in our country, the best of our LLB students go abroad for LLM and take up jobs there depriving the country of its talent. The Students from the neighboring countries including Nepal, Bangladesh, Middle East and African continent, who used to come to our universities for LLM also do not come anymore, because of the longer duration of our course and its shorter duration even in neighbouring Asian countries. With the entry of foreign universities in the country under the new policy of the Government everybody will seek admission to one year course of those universities rather than the





universities to take NET and become eligible for teaching positions in our universities while it requires two year LLM degree from our own universities.

For quite sometime the legal academics in the country have been deliberating on these anomalies and suggesting adoption of one year LLM degree course. Finally even the present Union Minister for Law and Justice has also recommended the adoption of one year LLM degree course.

In this background the West Bengal National University of Juridical Sciences (WBNUJS) has through its Academic Council approved a one year LL.M programme, which is enclosed with this letter. As the UGC has not yet approved a one year LLM programme from our universities to take NET and teaching positions, the WBNUJS has decided to open the one year course to foreign nationals and those nationals who are not interested in university teaching career. From the enclosed course you will please note that it is much more rigorous and demanding than the LLM courses abroad. Hoping that the UGC will soon agree to one year LLM course and pending such decision will have no objection to the kind of course WBNUJS is introducing from the academic year 2010 - 11.

As you are well aware all universities abroad including the universities in the Asian countries such as Japan, Singapore, Hong Kong have one year LLM course after LLB. Even those Universities, such as London University, which until some years ago had two year LLM course have long changed it to one year course. It is only we who continue to have LLM as a two year course on the pattern of masters course in other disciplines. Legal education is, however, not comparable with other disciplines because of longer duration of LLB course in three as well as five year streams.

In view of longer duration of LLM course in our country, the best of our LLB students go abroad for LLM and take up jobs there depriving the country of its talent. The Students from the neighboring countries including Nepal, Bangladesh, Middle East and African continent, who used to come to our universities for LLM also do not come anymore, because of the longer duration of our course and its shorter duration even in neighbouring Asian countries. With the entry of foreign universities in the country under the new policy of the Government everybody will seek admission to one year course of those universities rather than the two year course of our universities. Interestingly the UGC permits LLM one year degree course candidates from foreign



universities to take NET and become eligible for teaching positions in our universities while it requires two year LLM degree from our own universities.

For quite sometime the legal academics in the country have been deliberating on these anomalies and suggesting adoption of one year LLM degree course. Finally even the present Union Minister for Law and Justice has also recommended the adoption of one year LLM degree course.

In this background the West Bengal National University of Juridical Sciences (WBNUJS) has through its Academic Council approved a one year LL.M programme, which is enclosed with this letter. As the UGC has not yet approved a one year LLM programme from our universities to take NET and teaching positions, the WBNUJS has decided to open the one year course to foreign nationals and those nationals who are not interested in university teaching career. From the enclosed course you will please note that it is much more rigorous and demanding than the LLM courses abroad. Hoping that the UGC will soon agree to one year LLM course and pending such decision will have no objection to the kind of course WBNUJS is introducing from the academic year 2010 - 11.

**10. Evaluation scheme for LL.M. Programme:**

Presently presentations and project submission are marked in every LL.M. course by the teacher teaching the course. The same teacher also sets the question paper for the end semester exam. But the end semester exam scripts are marked by an external examiner. In several highly specialized courses, the University faces the difficulty of finding a competent examiner. The external examiners also often delays results. It is proposed that the end examination scripts may also be marked by the course teacher. For ensuring quality and fairness in the award, appropriate powers may be assigned to the P.G. Council.

**11. Proposed rules for admission for M. Phil, Ph.D & LL.D.- eligibility conditions:**

The proposed regulations for eligibility conditions for M.Phil/Ph.D/LL.D. are as follows:-

(i) M. Phil – An applicant seeking admission to M. Phil degree should have a LL.M. Degree either for NUJS or for any other recognized University having secured not less than a 'B' grade or a aggregate of 50% marks & or its equivalent.

Must have passed entrance test conducted by the University for the same.

(ii) Ph.D - An applicant seeking admission to Ph.D. degree programme must have an M.Phil/LL.M. Degree in Law either for NUJS or for any other recognized University having secured not less than a 'B' grade or an aggregate of 50% marks in LL.M. or its equivalent.

In appropriate cases, the P.G. Council of the University on the basis of the appropriate representation made by the candidate, may permit the candidates for M. Phil/Masters degree in any other discipline to take admission in Ph.D.

Must have passed entrance test conducted by the University for the same.

(iii) LL.D. – An applicant seeking admission for LL.D. degree programme must have a Ph.D. in Law related subject.

In appropriate cases, the P.G. Council on the basis of the appropriate representation made by the candidates may permit the candidates with Ph.D. Degree in any other discipline to take admission in LL.D.

**12. Regulation for the Scholarship:**

From the academic year 2009-10 the University has introduced scholarships up to ten per cent of the students.

Regulatory mechanism for awarding scholarship to the students of the University, as proposed by the Scholarship Committee, are hereby put up for kind perusal & approval by the hon'ble members of the Academic Council.

- ❖ Serving in the **IPS** (Indian Police Service) since 14<sup>th</sup> November 1978.
- ❖ **Assistant Superintendent of Police** from 1978 to 1982 in the sub-division of Ranchi, Jamtara and Dumka. Worked in the villages dominated by Schedule Tribes (weaker sections of society) for ensuring their social security, crime prevention, crime detection, maintaining order and ensuring Human Rights.
- ❖ **ADC** (Aide-de-camp) to the Governor of Bihar State during 1981 – 82.
- ❖ **Superintendent of Police**, from 1982 to 1988, of the districts **Palamu, Gaya and Munger in the state of Bihar**, each of these districts having a population of 3 to 3.5 million. I was responsible for Crime control maintaining law and order, crime detection, traffic regulation and security of VIPs and ensuring protection of Human Rights of the citizens of these three largest districts of Bihar. I was also responsible for maintaining discipline, morale and administration of police force

of more than 2000 men in each of these districts. This was the period when I started field work for women's rights and child rights. The first crime of trafficking was registered by me in Bihar State and thereupon took up the rescue and rehabilitation of trafficked children, followed by law enforcement on traffickers and abusers. **My rescue of children, who were trafficked for labour** and thereupon exploited in several ways including sexual abuse, opened up a new chapter in the history of child labour in India, with several activists coming into the picture.

- ❖ Worked as Superintendent of Police, Criminal Investigation Department (C.I.D) as incharge of the **Special Cell dealing with crimes against women and weaker sections of the society**. Several crimes of trafficking in Bihar were dealt with by me. Initiated several steps for prevention of exploitation of children and women.
- ❖ Superintendent of Police in **Central Bureau of Investigation** during the period 1990 to 1995. CBI is the prime-investigating agency of the Government of India dealing with the investigation of important corruption cases and mandated to take steps for prevention of corruption. CBI has also a wing dealing with specialized crimes entrusted by the Supreme Court and High Courts. I had served both these wings of CBI, as mentioned below:
  - Superintendent of Police, **Anti Corruption Branch of CBI** 1990 to 1995. I was responsible for carrying out all steps to collect intelligence against corrupt officials, register cases against them, investigate the cases, take them to their logical end, prosecute the corrupt officials and pursue the cases with the Courts for convicting the guilty and also pursue with the departments concerned for ensuring departmental action against the delinquent. I had organized several trap cases wherein the corrupt officials were caught red handed. I had also investigated serious frauds in nationalized banks, Insurance companies, public sector undertakings including Railways. Criminal intelligence collection regarding amassing of illegal wealth, disproportionate to the known source of income, by government officials was one of the important tasks attributed to me. Several such crimes were registered, investigated and taken to their logical end.
  - Superintendent of Police, **Special Crime Branch of CBI**. I had been entrusted with very important cases for investigation. Some of the important cases are:-
    - **Rajiv Gandhi Assassination Case:** I was part of the SIT (Special Investigation Team) which investigated the assassination of the former Prime Minister of India on 21.05.1991. The accused have since been convicted by the Supreme Court of India.
    - **RSS Building Blast case, Madras:** A crime committed by religious fundamentalists, blasting a building with the explosive RDX, killing 11 persons. The accused are facing trial in the Court based on the charge sheet filed in CBI after investigation carried out under my supervision as the head of the Investigating team. The offenders have been convicted by the Court.

- ✓ **Assault** on Advocate Vijayan of Madras – a case of violation of Human Rights and abuse of position: Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in its Judgement has commended the investigation of this case.
  - ✓ **ISRO Espionage case:** Though this started off as an espionage case, the investigation led me to discovering violations of Human Rights and Women's Rights by several policemen who had investigated the case before CBI took over. Due to my investigation, the Supreme Court of India awarded monetary compensation to all the women and other victims who were arrested and harassed by these police officials.
- ❖ **Deputy Inspector General of Police, Central Bureau of Investigation, Special Crimes Division 1995 till April 1998:** During this period, I have supervised the investigation of work performed by the five Superintendents of Police and all the investigating officers working under them. I personally attended to the investigation of very many important cases. Some of them are listed below:-
- ✓ **Case of Trafficking of children for commercial sexual abuse and Pedophilia,** a case with international ramifications entrusted to CBI by the Home Ministry. The investigation of this crime opened up a new history in the world of child abuse and exploitation in India. This was the first case in India to establish international linkages and ramifications of trafficking and pedophilia. Moreover, the investigation of this crime gave me exposure to international transfer of evidence and to the international systems of investigation prosecution, victim care and protection.
  - ✓ Several cases of violations of women's rights including crimes of **rape, custodial death, missing person** and other offences against body and property, wherein the accused were often very highly placed individuals. These cases were entrusted by various High Courts or by the Government of India to the CBI for investigation. One of the classic crimes investigated by me led to the conviction of the then Advocate General (the Chief Law Officer) of a state.
  - ✓ Several crimes of **child abuse, child exploitation and violation of rights of children** were investigated by me. One of the crimes investigated by me was a crime of organized racket in which a father, a highly placed government official, who was continuously abusing his own daughter, in tandem with, several other colleagues. The investigation of the case led the legal battle to the Supreme Court of India wherein the Apex court delivered a landmark Judgement in 2004, bringing out many important points for ensuring child rights in the criminal justice system.
  - ✓ Several cases of **violation of Human Rights** by law enforcement agencies entrusted for investigation by the Supreme Court, High Courts of Delhi and Guwahati etc.
  - ✓ Abduction of **Mr. J.S. Khalra, Human Rights Activist of Punjab.** Hon'ble Supreme Court of India has commended the work done by me in this case.

- ✓ **Abduction of Sanjoy Ghose**, famous NGO Social worker and activist. The accused have since been convicted.
  - ✓ Several cases of **homicide**, entrusted to CBI by various High Courts.
  - ✓ **Air Dropping of Arms and Ammunition in Purulia, India** - a case of **international arms smuggling**. This case had ramifications in several countries where investigation had to be carried out. This includes Latvia, Bulgaria, Demark, U.K., Singapore, Thailand etc. The accused have since been convicted by the Court of Law on the basis of the charge sheet filed by CBI. I was the DIG in charge of the investigation of the case.
- ❖ **Deputy Inspector General of Police, Anti Corruption Cell of the Central Bureau of Investigation, New Delhi from July 1998.** This is a highly specialized Central Unit of CBI dealing with serious frauds and corruption cases against highly placed officials and public personalities. I had personally investigated several such cases, which even had ramifications throughout the country as well as international. These cases include:
- Crimes of amassing disproportionate assets by Ministers.
  - Allegation of misuse of official position by Ministers and senior public servants.
  - Illegal transfer of huge funds abroad and illegal receipt of foreign funds into the country by organized criminals and public figures, violating the economic laws and provisions.
  - Misuse of position and funds by public representatives which involved organized nexus of several persons across the country.
- ❖ **Deputy Inspector General of Police of the Multi-Disciplinary Monitoring Agency (MDMA) during Jan 1999 to Jan 2000.** This is a Special Task Force created by **Government of India** to investigate into the larger conspiracy in the assassination of Mr. Rajiv Gandhi, former Prime Minister of India. The investigation also included serious frauds and money transactions by various suspects, carried out mostly abroad, so as to facilitate the assassination. The Task Forces was assigned to investigated the international links regarding the funding, fund raising etc involved in the crime.
- ❖ **Deputy Inspector General of Police, Rohtas Range, Bihar during April 2001.** On completion of the tenure of deputation with the CBI, I was posted as the DIG of this range with command over 4 districts of Bihar (Rohtas, Buxar, Bhojpur, Kaimur). I was specially deputed for ensuring peaceful conduct of the gram panchayat elections during April 2001. The task was well accomplished. The outlook was to ensure free and fair elections and to see that the underprivileged are able to exercise their rights. I ensured that women could vote without fear or favour and this was widely appreciated.



- ❖ **Inspector General of Police, Criminal Investigation Department (CID), Bihar Police, Patna**, during May 2001 to March 2002. I was assigned the task of looking after this important wing of Bihar police. The CID was responsible for investigating important cases, especially having inter-district and inter-state ramifications. I setup "**Child Rights Cell**" in the CID, to address the issues relating to children. Anti trafficking was on my priority agenda. I have been instrumental in issuing directives by the Chief of Police (DGP) to all field formations about the Human Rights principles to be followed in preventing and combating trafficking. This Police order of year 2001 is the first of its kind in Bihar and, perhaps, in India.
- ❖ **Nodal Officer of the National Human Rights Commission**: During March 2002 to April 2004, on the request of the NHRC, the government had placed my services with the NHRC and, thereupon, with an **NGO, the Institute of Social Sciences, New Delhi**, to work on the project, '**Action Research on Trafficking in Women and Children**'. This Action Research is the first of its kind in the world in several respects. It is a comprehensive study of the subject from a Human Rights perspective. I was the Principal Researcher-cum-Investigator, data analyst and report writer. The report, in two volumes, has been released by the NHRC in August 2004. It is being published as a book by Orient Longmans, 2005.
- ❖ **As Special Secretary, Home Special Department of the Govt of Bihar** during 2004. Besides my main task of facilitating the District Magistrates and District Superintendents of Police in Criminal Administration, I had carried out Anti trafficking campaigns on the bordering villages of Kishanganj and Araria districts of Bihar. These two districts on the Indo-Nepal border are known to be high source areas for trafficking. The activist role undertaken by me led to the establishment of a very strong anti trafficking network involving government officials and NGO's functioning at the grass roots level. This network was sensitized, trained and was effectively put into action for prevention of trafficking.
- ❖ **As Inspector General of Police, Central Reserve Police Force, Jammu Sector of J & K**, December 2004 to April 2006, I was responsible for the CRPF activities of the entire Jammu sector of J&K state. The job includes anti-terrorist activities and measures to prevent terrorism. In the process of winning the hearts and minds of the public, I had started off various innovative steps in public service, which includes steps for the care and protection of women in the interior places of J&K state. In consultation with childline and NGO's, the ground rules have been prepared to set up a child helpline and address the issues of missing children, trafficking in children as well as care and protection of vulnerable children.
- ❖ **As Project Coordinator, Anti Human Trafficking, UNODC** (United Nations Office of Drugs and Crime), during April 2006 to April 2008, I was responsible for the implementation of the largest Project of UNODC on anti human trafficking. The activities included capacity building of law enforcement officials, developing resource materials like SOPs, Hand Books, Manuals etc, setting un Integrated Anti Human Trafficking Units and making them functional, and developing networks among law enforcement agencies and NGOs in the country. The Project, in two years period, has made tremendous achievements in all these tasks and much more. The report of the independent evaluators available in the

website ([unodc.org/India](http://unodc.org/India)) gives the details of the commendable outputs in the Project.

I continued with the mission of Anti Human Trafficking, in several ways. This includes facilitating rescue by police and NGOs, involving corporates for rehabilitation, capacity building enforcement officials and spreading the mission of Anti Human Trafficking through different methods and by opening up new windows and opportunities.
- ❖ **As Inspector General of Police in charge of Operations of CRPF,** I have undertaken innovative steps in improving the operational efficiency, human rights approach and best delivery of CRPF towards national security and public safety. 2.	Term of the Award of Scholarship	<u>RESOLUTION</u> The Members resolved that each Scholarship shall be awarded for one academic year, or for such other term as recommended by the Committee.
3.	Formation of a Committee to Process the applications of Scholarship.	<u>RESOLUTION</u> The Members discussed at length and resolved that a Committee to process the applications of the Scholarship, the Vice Chancellor of the University every year shall constitute a committee consisting of three to five members including the AR (Academic) who shall be the Convenor of such Committee.
4.	The date of invitation and submission of application for scholarship	<u>RESOLUTION</u> The application for the Annual Scholarship should be invited by 10 <sup>th</sup> of July every year after due publication by AR (Academic). The last date of submission of the application of Scholarship should not be beyond 25 <sup>th</sup> of July every year. In case of Sunday or holiday it will be allowed till the day of reopening. Under any circumstances no application should be entertained after the last date of submission of the application for Scholarship, provided in exceptional cases the Vice Chancellor at anytime may entertain any application during the academic year.
