Amendments to the 2. the West Schedule, Bengal National University of Juridical Sciences Act, 1999 (Act IX of 1999 published in Calcutta Gazette of 3rd August, 1999)

According to Sec. 20 of the Act, power to amend Schedule is given to the General Council of the University with the prior approval of the Chancellor and the State Government

On the basis of the experience of the past two years the Executive Council felt that the Council should have a larger representation of experts from the legal profession, the judiciary and the academia for which the Council desired to amend Clause 7 of the Schedule relating to Membership of the Executive Council. The proposed amendments are as follows:

A Judge of Calcutta High Court (a)

- to be nominated by the Chancellor (b) The Advocate General of West Bengal
- Two Lecturers or Assistant Professors of the University by (c) rotation

It was further desired by the Executive Council that the Hon'ble Law Minister of the Government of West Bengal under whose administrative control the University is dealt with in the Government and who is a member of the General Council be included as a member of the Executive Council and the Judicial Secretary be the member of the Finance Committee also.

Further, a technical amendment is required in sub-clause (e) of Clause 7 in order to clarify that the Judicial Secretary as he is known in the Government of West Bengal is intended under the provision (instead of Law Secretary).

The necessary approval has been received from the Government of West Bengal for the amendment. The Executive Council may recommend the amendment for approval of the General Council.

The Executive Council recommended the amendment for approval of General Council.

Regulations on 3. Procedure for Appointment of Vice-Chancellor

The Vice-Chancellor presented the Regulation to the Council:

- (i) At least six months before the expiry of the term, the Vice Chancellor/Registrar shall report to the Executive Council which will constitute a Search Committee consisting of the following members:
 - (a) A nominee of the Chancellor who shall be the Chairman of the Search Committee.
 - (b) A nominee of the Executive Council from among its members excluding the employees of the University.
 - (c) A nomince of the Government of West Bengal proposed by the Judicial Department.

General Council approved the amendments.

Nominations against the new membership have now been received which takes effect from the Ninth Meeting of the **Executive Council**

Regulations reported to General Cornerit

- (d) A nominee of the General Council excluding the employees of the University;
- (ii) The Search Committee will evolve its own procedures, meet as often as needed and propose within a period of six months a panel of three names eligible for the position (not necessarily in any priority) along with their detailed bio-data. The Search Committee should ascertain the availability of the nominees for the position.
- (iii) The Executive Council will consider the names, select one person and send the recommendation for consideration of the Chancellor on whose approval, the Council would offer the job of Vice Chancellor to the person concerned.
- (iv) If for any reason, the person selected does not join the position in reasonable time, the Council will consider another name from the panel and repeat the procedure as outlined above.
- (v) The Search Committee can make recommendations for the consideration of the Executive Council such terms as found appropriate while offering the position to the candidates identified.

The Executive Council approved the Regulation. The Executive Council also recommended that Sec. 18 of Act be amended to include "jurists" along with "professors" of law as a qualification for the post of the Vice-Chancellor for which a prior permission of the government and the Chancellor may be sought following the usual procedure.

4. Regulations on Procedure for Appointment of the Registrar.

The Vice-Chancellor presented the regulation to the Council:

Section 20 of the Schedule stipulates that the Registrar shall be appointed by the Executive Council and the terms and conditions of service shall be such as may be prescribed by Regulations.

Presently one of the Senior Professors is acting as Registrar on ad-hoc basis. Being a statutory position and a whole time job, it may be necessary to seek a full time official for the post of Registrar for which Regulations are necessary to be evolved. Hence the Regulations.

- (1) The Registrar should be selected through advertisement and open selection by a Selection Committee constituted by the Vice Chancellor with himself as the Chairman, a nominee of the Executive Council as member and an expert in educational administration nominated from a panel of names approved by the Executive Council as member. The Selection Committee thus constituted should recommend a panel of at least two names to the Executive Council from whom the Council may choose one for appointment.

The University has now over a dozen Lecturers in position of whom three are in Social sciences.

The amendments were approved by the Executive Council.

6. Induction of a distinguished educationist with a science background into Executive Council as a member to assist the University in its endeavour to teach science related law courses.

The Vice-Chancellor explained that the University is developing a curriculum which is increasingly science related. Apart from contribution in framing syllabi of science related law courses, their participation in Executive Council and General Council will help in developing the science related activity and programmes of the University.

The Council approved the proposal and felt that this could be done under existing Regulations while exercising the power to nominate.

7. Estimated cost for construction of NUJS Branch of Bank

The Vice-Chancellor presented to the council that initially it was planned that the Bank will be inside the main academic building and the estimates and plans were approved accordingly. Subsequently on discussion with various Banks proposing to set up extension counters, it emerged that they would allow outsiders also to have access to the Bank and the ATM. It was not desirable that strangers and outsiders should gain access into the academic block, which would inter-alia cause security problems. In order to avoid this, it was decided that the bank should be at the boundary wall having its access on the outside and no access from inside. This would apply for ATM as well. Presently the proposed location is at NUJS boundary about 10 feet away from the access road to the hostel having openings on the road with no access from inside.

The Architects and Project Management Consultants of NUJS in consultation with Bank has worked out the necessary designs and estimated cost of the separate Bank building which due to its separation from the main Academic Block, is not included in the HUDCO loan. The estimated cost of construction is being prepared by the Project Management Consultants, which will be tabled at the Meeting.

This amount ay be taken as loan from the bank itself adjustable against the rent payable by the bank to NUJS. The Bank has agreed to pay a rent of Rs. 18/= (Rupees Eighteen) only per square feet along with the landscaping and maintenance of the central courtyard of NUJS. The annual rent from the Bank at above rate is likely to be Rs. 18×1500 sq.ft. x 12 = Rs. 3,24,000/= (Rupees Three lakhs and twenty four thousand) only.

The Council deliberated upon the matter and authorized the Vice-Chancellor to negotiate with the Chairman of the Corporation Bank and settle upon terms and conditions in such a way that the University will be able to pay back the loan amount for construction with interest out of the rent payable by the Bank.

Report on negotiations put up separately.

8. Security Service of the new campus - arrangement in the light of incidents at the office of Registrar on the day of the last Executive Council meeting on 02.02.2002.

The Registrar reported that on 2nd February 2002, on the day of the last Executive Council meeting, at about 2:00 p.m. some persons allegedly from M/S. Panther Security Services met the Registrar and alleged that the University had wrongly rejected their valid bid on 31.01.2002 and as such the University should re-tender on Security Services. The Registrar tried to explain to them that their tender bid did not meet the requirements set forth by the University that the firms should indicate cost for:

- (a) Shift 'A' 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. for one person and
- (b) Shift 'B' 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. for two persons

Instead they have given a quotation per person for three shifts. Even while agreeing that it was as pointed out by the Registrar, they insisted that their fresh bid should be accepted. They were very rude during this period.

The Registrar, under advise of the Vice Chancellor, told those persons that they may send their papers by post and Vice Chancellor deferred the award of the contract.

The matter was placed before the Executive Council for necessary decisions in this regard.

The Council discussed the matter and initial award to M/s. Indian Ex-Services League was upheld for implementation.

Contract awarded and security is now in place.

9. Report on the progress of fitting of ceramic non-skid tiles on the floor of the toilet block and cost thereof.

As mentioned in Item No. 6 of the 7th Executive Council Meeting held on 2nd February 2002 minutes, Hon'ble Mr. Justice B. N. Kirpal and Mr. K. K. Venugopal had desired that the Project Management Consultants should work out the additional cost of flooring of the toilet blocks of the hostel, should Kota stone flooring or Ceramic tiles flooring is opted for instead of the existing mosaic floor which gave a very shabby appearance. The Project Management Consultants have now submitted the expenditure as follows:

(a) Kota stone flooring Rs. 2.50 lakhs(b) Ceramic tiles flooring Rs. 2.75 lakhs

The Project Management Consultants have further recommended Ceramic tiles flooring for quick work and better finish. The increase of cost being so marginal, the Vice Chancellor permitted the fitting of non-skid ceramic tiles for the floor of the hostel toilet blocks.

The Council approved the ceramic tiles flooring as proposed and action taken by Vice-Chancellor in this regard.

Actions taken accordingly.

10. Outsourcing of Civil and Electrical Maintenance Services.

The 7th Executive Council deferred the award of the contract for Civil and Electrical Maintenance as no visits were made to these firms and their clientele. The Registrar, along with the Accounts Officer and Executive Assistants have now visited these firms and their clientele and recommend as follows:

The Council awarded the contract for electrical maintenance to M/s. Vilas Industrial Automaton and Services Pvt. Ltd.

Introduction of B. J. Sc. Course

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There has been an increasing demand almost from the inception of NUJS to introduce courses suitable for persons in the legal field who do not want to practice in court. For example, Advocate's Clerks, Judge's Researchers, NGO workers, Legal officers, Para legals et al. With a view to satisfy this increasing market force, the idea of B. J. Sc. Course was mooted at the 3rd meeting of the Executive Council, held on 15th July 2000. The Executive Council had noted and approved the course and

desired that a detailed syllabi be formulated by the Academic Council along with Regulations for consideration of the Executive Council. In the 3rd meeting of the Academic Council held on 19th August 2000, the Regulations were framed and syllabi approved and recommended for approval of the Executive Council. The Regulations and syllabi were again placed before the 4th meeting of the Executive Council on 16th September 2000 for introduction in 2001-2002 session the Council deferred the matter on the ground that adequate number of teachers and required space was not there. With more number of teachers now available and space being available since initially the course will be in the evening shift after 04.30 p.m. and since the new academic block was expected to be ready for use in November-December 2002, the matter was again placed before the 7th meeting of the Executive Council held on 2nd February 2002. During this intervening period the demand for such a course is further increased.

No action warranted.

Report on division of Institutional fee received from Ford Foundation Project

A sum of 2,50,000 US \$ was received from Ford Foundation, New Delhi towards School of Criminal Justice and Administration Project in November 2000. The fund is meant to be utilised for the project within two years.

The matter was deferred as recommended by the Academic Council.

It was decided that the expenditure incurred by the University towards logistical and administrative support, that cannot be directly charged to the Project fund will be realised by the University in lump sum which shall not exceed 15% of the total cost. The Project has now completed one year and the Project is charged 7.5% (half of 15%) of the grant of 2,50,000 US \$ towards use of space, library, electricity etc. Several students also contributed to the preparation of papers, holding of training sessions and collection of data for the Project. As such it was decided that 60% of the amount due to the University may go to the Campus Development Fund. The remaining 40% may be equally divided and deposited to the Staff Welfare Fund and Students Scholarship Fund. The deposits have been made accordingly.

The matter was noted by the Council

Hostel and Classroom furniture and acquisition

The construction of the NUJS Halls of Residence and Academic blocks are progressing satisfactorily. It is expected that the shifting of furniture will commence from 15th May 2002. It is proposed that the existing furniture in the hostel will first be distributed in the double rooms. New furniture will have to be acquired for the single rooms. It is proposed that each seat will be furnished with a cot, a table, a chair, a moulded stool, a wall shelf (preferably folding and made of steel), and an extendable wall clothes peg. The Finance Committee had forwarded the following for consideration of the Executive Council with a suggestion for possible negotiation and reduction in cost.

The Executive Council talked to the supplier on reduction of cost. The manufacturer made out before the council that he had already given the furniture at minimal whole sale rate and he was unable to reduce any further.

The Council then looked at the position in other Institutes like the Indian Institute of Management Calcutta (IIMC). It was found that in IIMC wooden furniture (plywood) was given. The items were cot, table, chair, bookshelf, cupboard and a bin for Rs. 9050/- per seat. In comparison the cost at NUJS was about Rs 8500/- per seat for cot, table, chair, and a bookcase. Among these the cot, bookcase (folding) was of twenty years' guarantee and powder coated. The table was of steel with drawers and wooden top and chair was plastic moulded. The Council felt due to the above reasons, contract for supply of furniture

could be given to M/s. Olefin Systems. The Council further suggested that arrangements for hanging mosquito-nets should as far as practicable be made with the cot. The Council awarded the contract for tables and chairs to M/s. Ashisco and cot to M/s. Olefin Systems only for those furniture needed immediately. The contract for cloth horses @ Rs. 700/- per piece was awarded to M/s D. H. Industries. This is in lieu of folding self costing more than double the cost of cloth horse

Instead of folding shelf cloth-stand was substituted making substantial savings.

Regarding supply of electrical fittings the Council approved the recommendations made by the University Infrastructure Development Committee and authorized the Registrar to proceed as per the usual procedures.

14. Kitchen and Laundry equipments

A list of Kitchen equipments have been prepared in consultation with students, staff and manufacturers. A report was put up at the meeting. It is also decided that coin operated washing machine will be provided at the common utility space on the ground floor for which the suppliers are being contacted. The cost estimates etc. was placed before the Council for its decision.

The kitchen equipment had been estimated at Rs. 12 lakhs approximately. Due to paucity of time tender already was invited details of which are given below: -

After completing the tendering process, the Project Management Consultants (PMC) recommended M/s. Damask Systems who is at L2 for award of contract. The reason assigned by the PMC is as follows:-

Recommendation – M/s. Damask Systems (L2) – Rs. 49,93,123.00

The Finance Committee recommended the proposal to Executive Council for awarding contract.

The Executive Council met representatives of PMC, Mr. N. C. Kundu and discussed the matter at length with them. Mr. Kundu explained why the contract could not be awarded to M/s. Pragati Engineering who was at L1. The reasons given by him are -

Reasons for not Recommending L1

(a) The firm offered a rebate of Rs. 8 lakh. They were asked to resubmit a detailed price breakup after rebate which they did. On fresh calculation it was found that their cost is in fact one lakh higher than what is shown by them. So after the rebate of 1 lakh the price remains the same so the actual rebate is Rs. 7,13,535.00 and not Rs. 8,13,535.00 as claimed by them.

- (b) The actual costing arrived at after calculations taking the discount into effect, are very low and unworkable.
- (c) They have suggested alternate makes/brands thus deviating from the tender procedure.
- (d) In view of this their offer is speculative and unworkable.

Being satisfied with the above, the Council awarded the contract for firefighting system to M/s. Damask Systems at Rs 49,93,123/- only.

Orders issued accordingly.

Award of contract of chlorination and deironing plant for water supply. The tenders for the award of contract of chlorination and de-ironing plant for water supply in the new campus was finalized. The Executive Council discussed the matter with the representative of the Project Management Consultants. The Council was informed that the water was sent for testing of bacteria, virus, microbes and chemical test. If the iron content was more than 0.3% installation of chlorination and de-ironing plant would be necessary. The report of the water testing is still awaited.

The Council authorized the Vice-Chancellor to award the contract should the installation of chlorination and de-ironing plant be necessary after the receipt of water testing report.

The plants were installed and are working satisfactorily.

17. Report on the Agreement with M/S. Allied Publishers Ltd. for undertaking publishing work of the University.

In view of the increasing number of publications that the School of Criminal Justice and Administration is likely to bring out during 2002 onwards, its production, storage and distribution will become a problem for the University. The School of Technology Law and Sustainable Development and The School of Economic Laws and Governance are likely to follow suit during this year itself with some publications in which case the problem is likely to multiply. Furthermore if the publication is given to some leading publisher, the University will not have to invest in printing and the University will get royalty regularly. M/S. Allied Publishers Ltd., a leading publisher in India; with world wide network expressed an interest in doing the publishing work of the University. For this purpose they have offered the following:

- (1) To supervise and monitor the pre-press and production of all publications.
- (2) To give professional expertise in book designing, cover designing, proof reading, etc. of high quality so that the University is able to capture the international market.
- (3) Ensure that the production is at par with international standards.
- (4) Ensure that the publications are widely distributed.
- (5) Create awareness among the readers and users in the market.

(6) To pay a royalty of 15% of the list price on each copy actually sold commercially,
and the University shall:

- (a) Receive 12 authors copies without charge.
- (b) To arrange to purchase a minimum of 200 copies of each published book in the first instance and pay the publisher Rs. 26,000/= (Rupees Twenty six thousand) only.
- (c) Pay for all additional copies purchased, @ Rs. 140/= (Rupees One hundred and forty) only net per copy.
- (d) No royalty will be payable on copies received/purchased by the University.

The Council noted the matter and desired that a separate arrangement be made with regard to the publication of Vol. I (West Bengal) with the publishers as the University had put the money for printing the volume.

18. Consider the Academic Regulations

The University has completed two academic sessions. Based on the experience of these two years, the Academic Regulations of the University has been revised. The Academic Council has recommended them for the approval of the Executive Council.

The Executive Council approved the same.

19. Information Systems for e-learning in Law and for its application in legal and professional development

Information technology and computation science have revolutionized teaching/learning and research particularly in higher education. Legal education is slowly but steadily following the road map set by engineering and management education in adopting electronic library and information sciences. The availability of legal databases and on-line services have facilitated this process. Legal education in future will be heavily dependent on its capacity to access e-information systems.

Keeping the above prospects in view, NUJS, conceived as a centre for excellence is proposing to set up a state-of-the-art information system in its permanent campus in Salt Lake, now nearing completion. The type of services and systems contemplated in this regard include the following:

- (a) Adequate number of Computers for students and faculty both in academic and hostel blocks inter-connected through local area net-work. A Computer Laboratory with 50 to 60 computers is to be part of the Laboratory.
- Internet access and connectivity at selected points in the hostel, academic and administrative blocks (Internet kiosks)
- (c) The server (hardware and accessories) developed or bought should be capable of being upgraded to enable NUJS to link up with other law teaching institutions in the country with a

view to maximize learning opportunities and promote joint research activities.

- (d) The website of NUJS will have to develop sufficient space to accommodate what are called course portals (descriptions of subjects and courses) and basic reading materials to enable self-study and guided instruction through distance mode (virtual class room).
- (e) Eventually a direct satellite link may have to be established to facilitate web-supported legal education between NUJS on the one hand and learners distributed in different places on the other. This will also provide facilities for multi-media learning and networking of institutions involved in social engineering through instrumentalities of law and policy.

With constant and continuing changes in IT and computer science, the law on the subject has started changing as well. We have Information Technology Act now supplemented by the Convergence Bill which embraces radio broadcasting with telephony, television and internet. To be able to keep the application of information systems with developments in technology, NUJS needs to plan comprehensively and pursue aggressively the goals of e-learning. Preparing the infrastructure towards this in terms of men and materials is the aim of this unique venture. In order to give technical inputs in this evolving enterprise, NUJS needs to have an MOU with engineering faculty capable in IT and Information Systems. The Engineering Faculty of Jadavpur and the IIIT at Trivandrum are likely partners in this enterprise with whom negotiations are on.

The Academic Council approved this proposal and forwarded to the Executive Council for its approval.

The Executive Council approved the project in principle and authorized the Vice-Chancellor to formulate clear proposals towards achieving the objects. The proposals when finalized with costing will be placed for further consideration. Meanwhile, consultancy arrangement for formulating plans may be made by the Vice-Chancellor for which the IIIT at Trivandrum may be engaged.

Consider the proposal made by Tata Iron and Steel Company.

The Tata Iron and Steel Co. approached the University asking for assistance regarding the export and import of steel and matters relating to anti-dumping and subsidies. It is difficult for them to understand the law and the legal system prevalent in United States and the European Union. They are also to understand the Indian Laws and policies regarding export and import of steel and issues relating to anti-dumping and subsidies etc. in the context of WTO regulations. They have sought the help of the University in understanding how litigation can be avoided whenever possible without losing their just rights and/or the preference of appeal wherever necessary.

The Company have also referred a case to the University for the University's comments on legal issues involved. NUJS is in the process of developing its capacity (library, curriculum, research etc.) on trade related laws while teaching on Business Laws in the LL.B curriculum is being organised. The School of Economic Law and Governance (SELG)

IIITK has entered into an MOU with NUJS - copy put up separately.

of the University with a small team of teachers and researchers, sputting together its plan of work in this regard. Consultancy work on practical aspects of international trade with help in building professional capacity to teach, train and research on emerging issues of vital importance to the country. However, SELG will have to hire special research staff and assemble materials to be able to do it at a professional level. Possibly Tata Steel is willing to help us build that capacity while getting our research support for their immediate problems. Thus it can turn out to be a mutually helpful arrangement.

An MOU is being negotiated

The matter was placed before the Academic Council which approved it and recommended for consideration of the Executive Council.

The Executive Council approved the proposal.

Appointment of a person experienced in Information Technology networking for development of the elibrary of NUJS.

Information technology and computation science have revolutionized teaching/learning and research particularly in higher education. Legal education is slowly but steadily following the road map set by engineering and management education in adopting electronic library and information sciences. The availability of legal databases and on-line services has facilitated this process. Legal education in future will be heavily dependent on its capacity to access e-information systems.

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In order to give technical inputs in this evolving enterprise, NUJS needs to have an MOU with engineering faculty capable in IT and Information Systems. The Engineering Faculty of Jadavpur and the IIIT at Trivandrum are likely partners in this enterprise with whom negotiations are on.

In view of the development of the above, a person experienced in Information Technology networking may be appointed for a period of six months only to supervise and develop the e-library of NUJS.

He may be paid an honorarium not exceeding Rs. 12,000.00 per month. IIIT has promised to send a couple of their post graduate students as internees for a few months to help us design the system to fulfill information needs for the future.

The proposal was approved by the Executive Council.

Two P. G. students of IIITK are expected to spend few weeks interacting with faculty and Librarian from August.

Report is expected before end of the year identifying needs, estimating cost and planning phased implementation

Additional Agenda Items

1.

To consider the second phase strategies for achieving excellence

The Vice-Chancellor mentioned that the University is into its third year now. During the preceding two years, the University was setting itself up to be fully functional and commence teaching, research, placement etc. During this period the University has already made a place for itself as a *potential centre for excellence*. Its balance-sheet of achievements at this stage looks very bright.

He said that time has come now when we have to start planning the strategies for the second phase. A note laying down some possible strategies was circulated among the members of the Executive Council to facilitate discussion of an action plan in this regard.

He put forward the following plan before the Council:

I. Infra-structure and Finances

To be able to think creatively and implement plans aggressively, it is necessary to have proper infra-structural facilities and adequate funds which at present NUJS does not have. If plans are deferred till it acquires proper infra-structure, then the quest for excellence will be indefinitely delayed. Therefore a plan needs to be evolved for implementation in phases.

NUJS will soon have a permanent building designed to serve the needs for the immediate future. It is a building constructed in less than 5 acres of land which obviously is insufficient for all its planned programmes. There is no faculty housing available; nor does it have a quest house for visiting professors or scholars. There is need for at least another 10 acres of land to be acquired nearby and construction for faculty/staff residences has to be undertaken early. Student amenities like playing fields have to be organized.

The new building requires an e-library, a state-of-the-art information system accessible to every student, teacher and staff as well as number of educational aids and equipments all of which will require heavy investment.

To be able to give suitable support services for pursuing education and scholarship at a level comparable to the best of institutions of its kind, an annual budget of Rupees ten crores may have to be mobilized. Today the budget is less than three crores of which nearly half the amount is raised by way of fees and the other half as grant from government. Unless the University is assured of steady flow of funds, it may not be able to implement academic programmes designed to achieve a degree of excellence in the near future. The system prevailing with private Universities like Harvard and Oxford for raising resources need to be considered if comparable excellence is to be aimed at.

II. Faculty Development

There are five Law Universities in the country today including NUJS, kolkata. There are some hundred other Universities which also teach law through their Law Departments or affiliated law colleges. All these law teaching institutions have, of late started attracting bright students. At the same time, none of them is able to attract competent teachers who can contribute towards achieving excellence. The fact is that there are not good law teachers produced under the existing system or that they prefer to take other jobs including legal practice rather than join full-time teaching. It is sad to find talented and motivated students unable to get a matching faculty to delve into the challenging world of modern jurisprudence beyond the horizons of compartmentalized knowledge and conventional frame of analysis. NUJS will soon have to find a strategy to overcome this predicament lest all its plans towards excellence should flounder on this count alone.

He made some suggestions for consideration. They are not given in any order of priority nor are to be taken as mutually exclusive:

- (a) A large pool of young eligible teachers may be appointed as Temporary Lecturers for a trial period of not exceeding two years during which time they may be trained, guided and evaluated for regular selection.
- (b) An LL. M. programme with fairly attractive scholarship may be announced to induce talented persons to take teaching as a career at least for five years with NUJS.
- (c) Increase the salary and perquisites of regular teachers substantially and provide fast-track promotional avenues to the really brilliant and hard working teachers.

(d) Make a determined effort to invite reputed scholars from India or abroad either on contract for one or two years, or for short-term teaching on negotiated terms which should be flexible, attractive and competitive. This would require separate assured finances either through endowments or otherwise. A search in other countries particularly of Asian scholars who may be inclined to come may have to be made.

Distinguished advocates, retired judges and even senior civil servants can be associated if they are disposed favourably to scholarship and are available for full-time teaching even if it is for a semester or two.

- (e) Retired law teachers who have a reputation for scholarship may also be invited as emeritus professors if they are willing to come for an year or two.
- (f) Twinning with reputed foreign law schools may have to be explored to avail of academic exchanges and for faculty development. Some assured funding by organizations like Ford Foundation or NRIs has to be sought for supporting faculty development and academic exchange programmes.
- (g) Through multi-media mode, efforts may be made to link with scholars outside for the benefit of improved instruction in specialized subjects.
- (h) Finally, a liberal programme of letting students study abroad for a semester or two for such subjects in which expert faculty is not available in India can also be explored, if the students can pay themselves for the costs involved.

III. Organization and Management

Autonomy and freedom with accountability are essential for academic excellence. NUJS does enjoy a certain measure of autonomy not available to conventional Universities. However, autonomy is linked with adequacy and availability of funds both of which are uncertain at the present moment.

For the present what needs to be discussed is how the University can bring in a much wider spectrum of scholars and experts in its decision-making bodies like the Academic Council and Executive Council. Perhaps representation for influential interest groups in the Executive and General Councils may help in mobilizing resources and establishing twinning arrangements with reputed institutions. Re-structuring of the University bodies needs to be considered in this regard.

IV. Goals-setting and Accountability

Another related issue warranting attention is setting achievable goals from time to time and extracting accountability from those in charge of different functions in the University. Being a small University at present it is possible for the Vice-Chancellor and the Registrar to oversee every aspect of life and activity in the Campus. With increase and diversification of activities, a system which can adapt and grow needs to be conceived and put in place gradually.

The enhanced expenditure was due to the fact that after the drawings were presented to the Faculty, it was found that the classrooms were small and could not accommodate 80 students and the auditorium could not accommodate 500 students and the Architects were requested to make larger classrooms and auditorium which necessitated increase in quantity of piles by 61 numbers. As such an enhanced cost of Rs. 18.12 lakhs was approved by the Executive Council by circulation on 11.04.2001 and confirmed in the 6th Executive Council Meeting on 08.09.2001. There is, however, still an extra expenditure of:

It is noted that the number of piles tendered were 737 and actually sunk after enhancement of area is 824, the actual increase being 87. M/S. Ghosh Bose and Associates Pvt. Ltd. were requested to justify the above excess expenditure. They have informed us that the total executed value increased due to dowel reinforced bars left by M/S. Simplex Projects Ltd. for columns which are required to extend the column beyond the pile cap for super structure work. The quantity of steel in the dowel reinforced bar has been considered in the steel reinforcement of the superstructure work of M/S. Bridge and Roof. Although this quantity of steel has been included within the scope of work of M/S. Bridge and Roof, the work has actually been executed by M/S. Simplex Projects Ltd. and the value thereof is paid to them and has not been paid to M/S. Bridge and Roof.

The amount has thus been paid to M/S. Simplex Projects Ltd. and is absorbed in the total cost of the project.

The Executive Council noted the details with approval.

5. Continuing Legal
Education Programmes
– Proposal to have joint
activity with NUJS
pending the
establishment of M. K.
Nambyar SAARC School
of Legal Sciences

The Vice-Chancellor informed the Council that M. K. Nambyar SAARC School for Legal Sciences is sponsored by the SAARC LAW Association and financed by the M. K. Nambyar Trust, New Delhi. It is yet to establish its infra-structure and is unlikely to get it ready before 2005. Meanwhile, the Steering Committee of the MKN School of Legal Sciences desired to have few continuing education programmes for the legal profession in the SAARC region, organized in association with NUJS, Kolkata for which it is seeking to have an MOU valid for a period of two years. The expenses involved in executing the programmes will be entirely met by the MKN School and the NUJS responsibility will be to lend its name, premises and faculty resources for which an institutional fee will be paid by the MKN School to NUJS. Being an international activity of advanced professional education, NUJS will be greatly benefited by this collaboration in building its own academic capacities and promoting scholarships in areas which will remain undeveloped otherwise. The arrangement being limited to a two-year

period, it will provide an occasion to review the advantages for both sides and decide accordingly.

The joint academic programmes contemplated during the twoyear period are : -

- Post-graduate programme on subjects such as International Trade Law and Advocacy, Information Technology and Media Law etc.
- 2. Joint Seminars and Workshops once or twice a year in any SAARC country on topics of professional importance.

Once the proposal is approved in principle the details will be worked out and administered by the Vice-Chancellor, NUJS under the guidance of the Executive Council, NUJS. The programmes will run on an experimental basis for two academic years, namely 2002-'03 and 2003-'04 by which time hopefully the M. K. Nambyar SAARC School of Legal Sciences will have established itself to continue the programmes under its own auspices.

The Executive Council approved the proposal in principle and authorized the Vice-Chancellor to respond suitably as and when the Trust or SAARCLAW seeks collaboration of the University in this regard.

Negotiations are on with SAARCLAW in this regard.

6. Inauguration of the new Campus of NUJS, Salt Lake, Kolkata

The Vice-Chancellor informed that though the building will not be ready for occupation till March, 2003, it is expected that the physical structure will be more or less completed by October/November 2002. The proposal is to formally organize the inauguration of the new campus in November 2002 so that the remaining works may be completed quickly in the next couple of months and shifting schedule may be prepared conveniently in order to commence academic work there for the year 2003-'04. In this connection some tentative decisions need to be made now for initiating early appropriate action.


The Council suggested dates for inaugural programme on October 25^{th} , 26^{th} and 27^{th} , 2002.

The total number of participants in the Conference is expected to be in the range of 150 to 200 of whom at least 100 will be from outside Kolkata. Participants have to be provided hotel accommodation for three days and air fare for travel at least to some of them. The estimated cost is around Rupees Fifteen to Twenty lakhs. There can be some sponsors to the event to meet part of the costs.

To mark the occasion a scholarly volume containing papers to be presented at the two-day Conference may be published for commercial circulation. Allied Publishers, a leading publisher with world wide network may undertake the job at their costs giving royalty on sales to the University.

The Vice-Chancellor mentioned that on consultation with some scholars, the theme of the proposed Conference suggested is :

"INDIAN LEGAL THOUGHT AND THE QUEST FOR JUSTICE"

The idea in proposing this topic is to re-visit the principles of Indian Jurisprudence long forgotten in modem legal discourses but still living in the customs and traditions of the people. The object is to explore the relationship between law and culture, law and philosophy, law and literature, law and history etc. in the context of the values of the social reform movements in different parts of India culminating in the Constitution of India. The assumption is that law and justice in the final analysis have to keep its rapport with the culture and ethos of the people if they are to fulfil their goals in society.

The theme will be explored by jurists, philosophers, and historians with available evidence and will try to relate them to the emerging globalization process in which a Unified System is tending to dominate legal culture irrespective of the perceptions and experiences of the people.

The academic advantage arising out of this exercise is to produce select teaching materials not available in conventional books to provide support to the "Justice education" agenda of NUJS. An Academic Chair on Indian Legal Thought may also be the product of this Conference.

There can be one more topic also on -

On approval of the proposal by the Academic Council, the matter was placed before the Executive Council which approved the theme and programme and authorized the Vice-Chancellor to constitute a high-power National Advisory Committee to help in identifying the scholars and invitees, setting the agenda and organizing the event appropriately for this historic occasion. The Council forwarded the proposal with its strong recommendation to the General Council for approval.

Invitation to President will be sent as soon as he is elected.

Meanwhile preparations are under way. Hyatt Regency gave concessional charges for stay of Guests and Seminars.

Bridge & Roof promised to finish up the main structure and do the front sides for inauguration purpose.

Ford Foundation in principle agreed to provide funds for the Hotel and Seminars.

Nominations to General Council, Executive Council and Academic Council under Amended Regulations

Several vacancies arose in the General Council of the University consequent upon the retirement of Hon'ble Mr. Justice A. S. Anand as the Chief Justice of India and later Hon'ble Mr. Justice S. P. Bharucha as the Chief Justice of India. Hon'ble Mr Justice B. N. Kirpal, Chief Justice of India, has now accepted to be the chancellor of NUJS. There were vacancies of judges to be nominated by the Chief Justice of India to the Executive Council and General Council

After the amendment to the Schedule to W.B.NUJS Act, two more positions for membership in the Executive Council was created.

Construction of bank building at NUJS Campus: **Finances and Procedure for Award of contract**

In compliance of Executive Council direction for setting up a branch of Corporation Bank at NUJS Campus, the Vice Chancellor had a talk with the Chairman of the Bank. Consequently, action has been initiated by the bank for setting up the Branch, for which necessary permission of the RBI has already been obtained. The Bank has also agreed to start operating immediately. One room has been temporarily earmarked on the ground floor of the Gents' Hostel for the Bank till such time as the separate Bank building comes up.

Strain Strain Strain

The Corporation Bank has agreed to advance a loan of Rs. 20 lakhs at 11.75% interest towards construction of the building of about 2000 sq.ft. floor area. One hall in the first floor measuring 500 ft. will be available for University and rest of the building will be in bank's use. The rent payable by the Bank will fully meet the repayment burden by way of loan instalment and interest.

M/S. Ghosh Bose and Associates Pvt. Ltd. had furnished a detailed estimate for the Bank building in the region of Rs. 24.77 lakhs, which was placed before the eighth Meeting of the Executive Council. The Council deliberated upon the matter and authorised the Vice Chancellor to negotiate with the Chairman of the Corporation Bank, and settle upon such terms and conditions that the University will be able to pay back the loan amount for construction with interest out of the rent payable by the Bank.

The estimate submitted by M/S. Ghosh Bose and Associates Pvt. Ltd. includes value of security items, electrical fittings, furnishing, etc. which the Bank normally arranged on their own. The items of work quantified by the architects have been independently evaluated by the Bank and M/S. Bridge and Roof (India) Ltd. on their existing rate of work. An analysis of the three estimates is in enclosed statement. The cost is expected to be substantially reduced, because of deletion of items that will be taken care of by the Bank, M/S. Ghosh Bose and Associates Pvt. Ltd have been requested to work on it and their revised estimates will be placed and their revised estimates. will be placed on the table. M/S. Bridge and Roof (India) Ltd., the building contractors of the academic and residential block had offered an overali rebate of 5% on the estimated cost of the work is undertaken concurrently with the main building work. > may be raised to 10 %

Bank had been given al documentary support in this regard and was requested to furnish a 'Status report' to be placed on the table.

This also is a pre-condition to the construction of Corporation Bank and the Corporation Bank given the status of being the official banker of NUJS.

Mr C. Laxman Shenoy, General Manager, Headquarters, with the Zonal Manager met the Vice-Chancellor on 6th July and reported that action for the HUDCO loan takeover is being taken by the Bank and an intimation will be sent to the University well before the Executive Council Meeting on 27th July. Memorandum of Understanding proposed to be signed with the Corporation Bank

The following Memorandum of Understanding is proposed to be signed with the Corporation Bank subject to approval of the Executive Council and forms a part of this agenda note.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of understanding is executed on the day of 2002 by and between THE WEST BENGAL NATIONAL UNIVERSITY OF JURIDICAL SCIENCES established under West Bengal Act IX of 1999 as a University for legal studies and research with permanent campus at Salt Lake, Kolkata – 700 098, hereinafter referred to as the University which expression shall mean and include, unless repugnant to context hereof, its successors—in-interest, administrators, nominees and assigns of the one side

AND

The CORPORATION BANK a leading Public Sector Bank having its headquarters at Mangaladari Temple Road, Mangalore – 575 001, hereinafter referred to as the Bank, which expression, unless repugnant to context hereof, shall mean and include its successors-in-interest, administrators and assigns, of the other side.

WHEREAS the University is desirous of having regular banking services extended to its campus at 12 LB Block, Salt Lake City, Kolkata and the Bank has agreed to provide the same as the principal banker of the University, this memorandum of agreement is executed, whereby it is mutually agreed as follows:

1. The Bank will set up a fully computerised branch, namely, the CORPORATION BANK, NUJS BRANCH at the space provided by the University.

- 2. There shall be provided nationally interconnected ATM facility at the proposed branch.
- 3. The University will provide building space of about sq/ft, of which 1000 sqft. on the ground floor and sqft. on the first floor. The location of the space will be in a separate building near the entrance gate of the university. The Bank will furnish the space according to their convenience and requirement. It shall take care of the maintenance of the building and bear charges on consumption of electricity. The security aspect of the building will be taken care of by the Bank.
- 4. The Bank will pay monthly rent of Rs. 20 per sq/ft. which will be increased by % after every years. The Bank will pay advance rent for 12 months. The terms for payment etc. will be decided in a separate agreement.

- 5. The branch will be open for University transactions between 10.00 A.M. to 5.00 P.M. and enjoy weekly holiday on
- The Bank will extend facilities including flexible deposits, at par remittance and collection facilities, educational loan for students and personal loans for staff etc. The salary account of the employees will be in a separate package with zero balance facility.
- 7. The bank will carry out the networking arrangement necessary for providing restricted on line access to university account
- 8. The Bank will take over at their prime lending rate the loan of rupees twenty crores the University has been sanctioned by the Housing and Urban Development Corporation (HUDCO), repayment of which has been guaranteed by the Government of West Bengal. The Bank agrees to work out the terms etc. on priority basis for acceptance by the University.
- 9. The Bank will undertake landscaping of the NUJS campus and maintain its gardens and lawns.
- 10. Modification of any of the clauses of this agreement will require notice of a period of three months from either side.
- 11. Any difference or dispute arising out of or in connection with interpretation and applicability of this agreement shall be settled by arbitration in Kolkata and will be subject thereafter, if warranted, to the jurisdiction of the courts in Kolkata

Proposal to Insure NUJS Assets

The NUJS possess movable assets worth more than a Crore in the shape of furniture, equipments, books and periodicals. With the new building partly under possession, and the remaining to be taken under possession in the course of the year, the value of tangible assets of the University will run into Crores of Rupees. None of these assets has been covered by insurance of any kind.

Since the building property is under loan mortgage, it has to be mandatorily insured against natural calamities and fire. Insurance of other assets is also similarly desirable. Any of the four wings of GIC, viz., National Insurance, New India Assurance, Oriental Insurance and United India Assurance, who deal in non-life insurance can be contacted in this regard.

The matter was put up before the Finance Committee which approved in principle the insurance of NUJS assets including the building but recommended that the matter be reported to the Executive Council.

All four subsidiary companies of the LIC were requested to offer their terms and conditions along with the premium structure. The comparative position will be placed on the table.

Installation of an additional transformer of 500 KVA along with an additional 11KV switch gear

In the initial stages of planning of the University building, it was decided that air conditioning work will be kept at minimum. Accordingly the WBSEB indicated a power requirement of 400 KVA.

Subsequently, when Executive Council members Mr. K. K. Venugopal, and Hon'ble Mr. Justice B. N. Kirpal, who is now the Chancellor of the University, visited the site it was decided that air conditioning of library, computer libraries and few Seminar Halls will also have to be done. Moreover, the University is now planning to install a state of the art information system. On appraisal of these developments, the WBSEB have now suggested installation of another 500 KVA transformer along with switch gear etc.

The matter was put up before the Finance Committee which has forwarded it for consideration of the Executive Council.

Keeping in view the developmental programmes of the University the Executive Council may like to approve the installation of another transformer.

They have explained the increase as follows:

The reason assigned for such increase was:-

1. Due to an increase in the area of the auditorium and Library blocks. It may be recalled the Executive Council had approved by circulation a sum of Rs, 18.12 lacs for such increased areas of construction. The increase had resulted because in the original drawings and plans, the size of the auditorium and library were too small to accommodate a large student body of about 500+.

- 2. Due to the Gujarat Earthquake of 26 January 2001, emphasis was given by renowned structural engineers that in RCC structure ductile detailing should be strictly followed. The adoption of this method has led to an increased requirement of steel quantity.
- 3. The Project Management Consultants/Architects have accepted a variation of ±5%.

Resolution for approval by circulation

Members would kindly re-call the decision of the Executive Council in its Fourth meeting on 16 September, 2000 assigning the pile foundation work of the campus construction for a total amount of Rs. 3,34,29,036/- (Rupees three crores, thirty-four lakhs twenty-nine thousand and thirty-six only) to M/s. Simplex Projects Ltd. This was based on the general construction plan of the campus as was then presented by the Architects M/s. Ghosh, Bose and Associates. The piling work started immediately thereafter and is fast nearing completion.

The plan and drawings for the super structure of the academic and residential blocks were thereafter presented in the Fifth Executive Council meeting dated 27 January, 2001. Based on tenders received and after negotiations, the Executive Council in its meeting on 27th January, 2001 decided to award the contract to M/s. Bridge and Roof Co. India Ltd., for a total amount of Rs. 14,19,13,761/- (Rupees Fourteen crores nineteen lakhs thirteen thousand and seven hundred sixty one only). The Work Order approved by the Works/Finance Committee on 3 April, 2001 is accordingly being issued.

Meanwhile on 6th March, 2001, the Project Management Consultants wrote to the University stating that the super structure of the Academic block would require some additional piles to strengthen the foundation in view of the increase envisaged in the space in the auditorium and some minor adjustments to be effected in corridors, classrooms and lift space. They calculated that what was needed was an increase of 500 mm diameter piles by 34 nos. and 450 mm diameter piles by 61 nos. for which the University must authorize an additional expenditure of Rs. 18.12 lakhs only. It was pointed out by the Faculty that some class rooms planned have only 50-60 seats whereas the strength of students in a class is 80. Similarly while the minimum number of students to be accommodated in the auditorium is 500 (the total strength as at present)the auditorium as planned had 370 seats only. The Architects were of the view that while the changes could be effected within the Executive Council approved cost of super structure construction, it would need some more piles in the foundation as explained earlier.



As it is a matter of authorizing expenditure of Rs. 18.12 lakhs, the Vice-Chancellor called a meeting of the Finance/Works Committee on 3rd April to consider the issue and make recommendations to the Executive Council. The Finance/Works Committee in its meeting on 3rd April, 2001, desired that the matter should be placed before the Executive Council for appropriate decision. Meanwhile the piling work is continuing. As such, there is great urgency to decide the matter. Hence this Resolution by circulation.

RESOLUTION

Resolved that in view of the circumstances stated above, the Executive Council accepts the proposal to increase the number of piles as stipulated in the Managing Consultants' letter No. GBPL/506/818/2001 dated 6.3.2001 and authorize the University for the additional expenditure of Rs. 18.12 lakhs only towards the pile work foundation works of the University.

Revised Budget Estimates and Financial Position

The revised budget estimates of the University and the present financial position of the University have been prepared. It was presented before the Finance Committee. After discussion the Committee recommended budget for consideration before the Executive Council.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDRUM

Current trend

• • Revenue

- Receipts: Main source of revenue receipts was Govt. grants and fees collected from students. The aim is to minimize the dependence on Govt.
- • Expenditure: Total revenue expenditure during the year 2001-2002 was Rs. 85.41 lakhs, which was only Rs. 1.05 lakhs (1.24%) more than the previous fiscal. This is despite increase in the number of students and augmentation of faculty strength to a considerable extent. The University is committed to contain its running expenses to the barest minimum.

Capital

- • Receipts: Main source of fund was HUDCO Loan (Rs.600 lakhs) followed by the grants received from the Govt. of West Bengal (Rs. 260 lakhs).
- • Expenditure: Major capital expenditure on 2001-02 was on construction of building (Rs.867.65 lakhs) which was about 95% of the total expenditure. Other capital expenditure on procurement of assets etc. (Rs. 27.51 lakhs) showed a declining trend as compared to the previous year (Rs. 64.76 Lakhs). Investments have increased from Rs.11.32 lakhs to Rs.28 15 lakhs.

The years ahead


In the revenue front, the University is progressively moving towards becoming self-supportive. While the main contribution will be from fees collected, sufficient fund is expected to be generated by expanding the extension activities and undertaking the research based projects.


Non plan recurring grant for 2003-2004 has been proposed for Rs 100 lakhs against current year's allocation o Rs. 130 lakhs. There will be gradual decline and by 2005-2006, recurring grant from the Government may not be necessary. The University will, however, depend upon the Government to repay the loan taken for construction of the building. The liability on this account, as projected by HUDCO over the period of years, is as under:





Norms Evolved to Streamline Project Accounting as per the University's and the Sponsors' recommendations

The University has several sponsored projects running. The SCJA project is funded by Ford Foundation, SELG project is funded by DEA-UNDP and STLD project is funded by the MOEF. In order to meet the individual accounting requirement of each project and the same time for maintaining an uniformity/parity. Some norms have been evolved by the Accounts Officer of the University for the project convenors to follow.

The matter was placed before the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee recommended that as the projects were approved by the Executive Council, the norms may be put up for approval before the Executive Council as well.

The norms thus evolve is give in the Annexure for consideration by the Executive Council.

W.B. NATIONAL UNIVERSITY OF JURIDCIAL SCIENCES

SPONSORED PROJECTS FINANCIAL NORMS

The NUJS has been increasingly receiving juridically relevant research-based projects from various sponsoring sources. When the University shifts over to the new campus, number of such activities will become manifold. These projects, all time bound, entail observance of diverse accounting formalities. Along side successful realisation of the academic demands, equally imperative is the need to maintain proper and transparent accounts of the financial records of these projects. Experience has shown that some of the well-known institutions, brilliant in their academic accredition, have been found wanting in matching their financial management with equal prudence, much to the dismay of promoters of the project. In the pursuit of excellence, it is to be ensured that the financial accounting of the sponsored projects in the NUJS is equally professional and unblemished. To this end, following guidelines are proposed to be adopted:

- Projects accounts will be maintained separately from the University accounts. In other words, each project will be treated as a separate responsibility and accounting centre to secure total transparency
- On receipt of an offer for undertaking any project, the conditionalities involved will be studied and a techno-financial projection will be made jointly by the Project Coordinator and the Executive Assistant (Projects). On its approval of the Vice-Chancellor, a detailed financial estimate will be prepared by the Executive Assit. In consultation with the Accounts Officer and the Project Coordinator.
- Immediately after receipt of fund/ sanction thereof, the estimates of expenditure will be reviewed to satisfy that these conform to the stipulations of the funding agency. The budget will then be placed for approval of the Vice-Chancellor.
- Expenditure will be regulated according to the estimates approved by the Vicechancellor who is the sanctioning authority of each items of expenditure. It may be clearly understood that approval of budgetary estimates constitutes administrative approval to undertake various activities, whereas financial sanction is necessary to incur expenditure.
- Execution of sponsored projects often involves organising seminars, workshops etc. while the academic part will be co-ordinated by the concerned Faculty, all organisational and administrative support, including travel and stay of the invitees, venue management, printing and distribution of course materials etc., will be rendered by the E.A. (P) and the designated office assistant.
- It must be ensured that cost of every items of services and facilities of the University are
 duly realised. For example, if the resource persons or others are to be accommodated in
 the hostels, room tent chargeable shall be Rs. 500 in addition to Rs. 200 for meals per
 person per day.
- Unless otherwise specified by the sponsoring authority, travel expenses of the participants shall be regulated as follows:

Participants

Outstation: Actual rail fare restricted to AC II fare by shortest route Local: Actual conveyance charges

Resource Personnel

- = Outstation: Air fair by direct route economy class. Senior citizen concession, wherever applicable, shall be availed.
- = Local: Transport will be provided according to the requirement of the resource personnel.
- Daily Allowance: No daily allowance will be paid. Instead local hospitality, including board and lodging will be arranged wherever necessary.
- <u>Honorarium</u>: Resource personnel, not being a member of the University faculty, shall be paid honorarium at rates decided by the Vice-Chancellor in consultation with the sponsoring authority.
- Use of project fund shall be most transparent and spending should be based on high standards of financial propriety. Outgo of fund for unproductive purposes, just because enough unspent balance exists, should be totally discouraged. The aspect demands abundant caution, as it directly contributes to the reputation of the University:—
- Due care shall be taken to ensure that the University funds are not used for meeting expenses relating to any particular project.
- The University normally charges institutional fees, not exceeding 15% of the total project cost; 60% of which going to the University Fund and the balance to Staff Welfare Fund. This is meant to cover manpower, logistic and support provided for execution of the project. Usually the amount is charged at the concluding stage. The Vice-Chancellor, while sanctioning the amount, will exercise his discretion to determining the sum chargeable and its allocation to different funds.
- For each sponsored project, a separate bank account will be maintained, which is
 operated jointly by the Vice-Chancellor and the Accounts Officer.
- There shall be no cash transactions out of these accounts.
- The bank account shall be in operation for the period it is absolutely necessary. On completion of project work, all claims shall be settled forthwith. The book balance will then be reconciled with the bank balance. Final account of the project shall be rendered to the funding agency together with the unspent balance, if any. The bank account will also then be closed. The whole exercise should be over within one month of completion of the project

MOU with IITM-K, Trivandrum, for consultancy services on development of the Legal Information System for NUJS

I. The Academic Council and the Executive Council discussed earlier a proposal from the Vice Chancellor for legal information systems for the University in the context of the digital Revolution. The Academic Council and the Executive Council approved the matter in principle and authorised the Vice Chancellor to work out the details.

The Vice Chancellor, who visited IIITM-K, entered into an MOU with them. He presented a copy of the MOU entered into with IITM-K, before the Finance Committee. The Committee noted the matter and recommended that the matter be placed before the Executive Council. Detailed proposals are to be evolved in stages for which two technical officers from IIITM are to visit NUJS shortly.

The project is proposed to be commissioned in phases. The first phase may commence with the development of requisite software which are customised to the needs of the University.

The MOU is signed with IITM to begin the work on the proposal and to do develop definite steps so that the first phase of the Information system can be mounted as soon as the construct is completed later this year. The MOU copy is enclosed for consideration and approval of the Executive Council.

II. An amount of Rs. 5 lakhs has been retained by HUDCO out of the loan sanctioned to the University. It is to be released within 2 years only if the University uses the money for Research & Development purposes for which NUJS has to put up proposal with budget estimates. If it is not done within the prescribed period, the money would lapse to HUDCO.

In the circumstances, it is proposed that the Legal Information System development project being done with IIIT-K can be submitted to HUDCO for release under the Researsh & Development Account. The Initial estimate is about Rs. 8 lakhs. As such, the whole of the amount with HUDCO is sought to be released to NUJS.

The Executive Council may consider and approve this funding proposal as well.

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MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Srivathsan, hereinafter referred to as "HTTM-K", which expression shall mean and include unless repugnant to context hereof, its successors-in-interest, administrators and assigns;

AND

The West Bengal National University of Juridical Sciences, a premier Institution of excellence established under West Bengal Act IX of 1999 as a University for legal studies in the state with permanent campus located at Salt Lake City, Kolkata – 700 098 through its Vice Chancellor, Prof. N.R. Madhava Menon, hereinafter referred to as "NUJS", which expression shall mean and include unless repugnant to context hereof, its successors-in-interest, administrators, nominees and assigns.

WHEREAS:

- HITM-K is an institution incorporated by the State of Kerala under Section-25 of the Companies Act, 1956 and is engaged in imparting education, research & development, inter-alia, in the fields of Information Technology, Information Systems, Applied Information Systems, Sciences and Management etc.
- NUIS is engaged in imparting Higher Education, conducting Training, Services, Research and other programs in the fields of and related to Law, Jurisprudence and Juridical Sciences.

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WHEREAS:

The parties have discussed and deliberated on various issues of mutual interests and benefits and have deemed expedient to execute this Memorandum of Understanding so as to mutually cooperate in areas of educational excellence, including domain knowledge sharing, providing training, knowledge development work, in studies related to legal education, research programs and services related to the fields of Law, Information Technology issues, Intellectual Property issues and development of

programs and products related to legal information and education services existing or which may be developed in future, whether client specific or otherwise. The parties to this MOU agree as follows:

HITM-K shall provide training & consultancy services to NUIS on relevant areas of interest.

NUJS may provide its expertise in the development of courses and advanced information systems related to IT Act, Cyber Laws, IPR and Legal implications in IT Enabled Services of diverse kinds.

- Participation of HITM-K in Information System & Services and Courseware identified jointly in areas, such as, E-Governance, E-learning, Law and Content Development etc.

The parties shall develop, introduce or promote specialized courses in various fields and technology applications. The parties will carry out joint developments in nationally important projects such as establishing, managing and training Legal Education and Services Grid, etc.

- The terms and conditions will be discussed and finalized on a case-to-case basis or subsequently as may be decided by parties.

The parties may as and when deemed appropriate enter into a more formal instrument and till such time the present Memorandum of Understanding shall operate.

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



Determination of Probation of newly recruited Teachers

In September 2001, the University appointed as many as nine Lecturers including three in Social Sciences of whom seven have joined and are continuing in service. Their first year of probation is to come to an end in September 2002.

There have been repeated written complaints from the student body against the poor quality of teaching of some of them. The University conducts a student evolution of teaching in different subjects. Some of them fared very poorly which was notified to them. The University conducted special programmes to enable the teachers to know how to improve their teaching skills and warned them in Faculty Meetings that their services at the end of probation will not be continued if they do not improve in performance. Another student evaluation is due in early September at the end of another semester of teaching and if the report is still unsatisfactory, the University proposes not to extend their services beyond the probationary period of the first year.

The matter is placed before the Executive Council so that the considered decision be given for action by the Vice-Chancellor at the end of September 2002.

Occupation of three floors of Hostel -**Inadequacies in Construction**

The G+3 floors of the Gents' and Ladies' Hostel were taken over as per schedule and have been in occupation since 15th June 2002. Apart from some minor infrastructural problems both the hostels are running smoothly.

However, after taking over, it was noticed that there was heavy leakage of water especially through the construction joints. The matter was pointed out to both M/s. Ghosh, Bose and Associates Pvt. Ltd., our Architect and Project Management Consultants, and also M/s Bride and Roof, our building contractors, who then rectified the problem of water leakage. But even now after heavy shower there is water seepage leading to excessively damp walls. We have again brought this to the notice of the Project Management Consultants who are now saying that the roof parapet wall plastering is yet to be completed and that leaves the capillaries open for seepage. They have further stated that every problem can be identified and rectified only after the whole building is complete. For the present, these issues are attended in pieces.

The matter is put up before the Executive Council for appropriate direction and decision.

We refer to your letter No. NUJS/B&R/Defect/2002/01 dated 17.6.2002 and sincerely regret for the delay in reply though we have already advised our Resident Manager to take necessary measures for rectification of defects, in consultation with your Architect M/s. GBPL. We understand this has been done and rectification work is being carried out accordingly.

We, being a reputable Organisation, do never compromise with quality of work and rectify the defects, if any, (without telling by others) which may sometimes occur in the civil engineering construction (not a very uncommon phenomenon) particularly in the high-speed Building work to urgently meet its functional requirement. We believe what we need is the mutual trust amongst B&R, NUJS & GBPL to achieve satisfactory performance.

You may be aware that in order to ensure good quality of finishing work, we have, apart from taking various other measures, deputed at site Shri B.B. Goswami, one of our very Senior Managers, to supervise in particular the Architectural and finishing items of work. One separate gang comprising a gang of highly skilled artisans will work under direct control of Shri Goswami. From our Corporate Office, Shri M. Bhattacharya — Dy. General Manager, will also visit site on regular basis to monitor work progress both in respect of time and quality. With all these arrangements, we are confident to achieve the desired performance. The quality of Building as you are aware, primarily depends on the type and quality of material specified to be used as per the choice of owner/architect and that is why the range of cost-variation is wide in building jobs. Hence, the quality of workmanship needs to be judged with respect to type of quality of materials specified to be used. Use of coarse sand in cement-sand plaster (interior walls) followed by white washing can not have a better finish look and we have little to do to improve on the inside plaster of room which was done with coarse sand, as directed.

Soaking of walls has resulted from Expansion Joint provided in the Wall. However, these gaps have been sealed in order to arrest the ingress of water, in consultation with

But such happening cannot question their conduct, nor can doubt their sincerity, dedication and involvement to the job. You might have noticed that our officer and staff are staying at site on number of occasions till late-night. Therefore, any ill-comment on their conduct and behaviour will only dampen their "will and zeal". You can always comment on the requirement and inadequacy, if any, of the "personnel" but it should not be "Personal".

Hope, we have clarified our position and once again assure you that there will be no lack of effort on our part to maintain quality and pace of work.

Item No. AA1.

Collection of Charges for Consumption of electricity by students at the Hall of Residence

The University has taken possession of ground plus three floors of the hostel buildings at the new campus where the students will start living from 17 June 2002 itself. Hostels are ready, with electricity, water supply, sewerage lines and a modern kitchen.

In addition to the room rent payable, it is proposed that students may also share the charges for electricity consumption. Separate sub-meters have been provided in each hostel and charges of electricity actually consumed will be shared by the students on pro-rata basis. Students will be required to pay the amount along with their monthly mess bills.

The Finance Committee approved the proposal and recommended it to the Executive Council. Placed before the Executive Council as recommended.

Item No. AA2. Refund of Fees to candidates who seek withdrawal after due date – To report

As per the schedule of Admission for 2002-03 session, the candidates who have been selected for admission but desire to withdraw subsequently shall be reimbursed the entire amount of fees paid after deduction of Rs. 10,000.00 provided, the intention is communicated on or before 20 May 2002. Thereafter only refundable deposits can be refunded in case of withdrawal.

It was noticed that a few students expressed their decision to withdraw on dates subsequent to 20 May 2002 for various reasons. These withdrawals would normally entail forfeiture of entire fees. However, keeping in view the fact that the University can still fill these vacancies from the waitlist, which is still operational, it is proposed to refund the fees to such students, who seek withdrawal between 21 May and 15 June 2002 (teaching commenced this year from 16th June) after deducting Rs. 16,000.00 which constitutes:

Admission Fees : Rs. 1,000.00
Academic Support Service : Rs. 5,000.00
Campus Development Fee : Rs. 5,000.00
Cancellation Fee : Rs. 5,000.00

Total: Rs. 16,000.00

For those who withdraw after commencement of teaching will receive only the refundable deposits.

<u>Item No. AA3.</u> **Installation of Washing Machines at the Hostel**

When the students shift in the new hostel they may face problems with cleaning of their linen and garments as there is no proper laundry service in the vicinity. To solve this, one medium capacity washing machine may be installed on each living floor. The initial cost of about Rs. 90,000.00 (Rs. $15,000.00 \times 6$) may be borne by the University; the maintenance and upkeep etc. to be looked after by the Students Committee. Charges on account of electric consumption will be borne by students themselves.

The matter was placed before the Finance Committee and it was decided that for the time being, only one washing machine at the middle level (2nd floor) of each hostel may be provided putting the responsibility for proper monitoring upon the Hostel Welfare Committee. It was recommended that the matter be referred to the Executive Council.

<u>Item No. AA4.</u> Supply of Uniform to Kitchen Staff – To report

A modern kitchen system, having all state of the art gadgets has been commissioned in the boy's hostel, which will presently serve the requirement of all students. One kitchen supervisor and three helpers who are employed for running the kitchen are being adequately trained for the purpose.


In order to secure hygienic environment in the kitchen, it is proposed to supply uniforms to the kitchen staff. Two pairs of bush shirts (half sleeve) and trousers will be adequate. In addition, each of them may be given one apron. The uniforms will be issued once in two years. Wearing of Uniform will be made compulsory. Tentative cost of supplying the Uniform will be Rs. 12,000.00 approximately.

The matter was placed before the Finance Committee for consideration. The Committee approved the purchase of uniforms and aprons for the hostel mess staff. However, the Committee decided to drop the proposal to supply them once every two years.

Re: Construction of the W B National University of Juridical Sciences at Salt Lake, Kolkata – General Building Work.

Please refer to the letter dated 08.07.2002 of the Managing Director of M/s. B&R addressed to you with a copy to us. We would like to express our views on some of the issues stated in the above letter to keep the record straight.

Regarding "cement sand plaster (interior wall) using coarse sand", we would point out that no where it is mentioned in the tender documents that coarse sand shall be used for plastering works. However the defects that were noticed and pointed out to M/s. B&R were mainly for non-maintaining the lines, levels plumb etc of the plastering work.

Regarding dampness in the Hostel rooms, we would mention that apart from the dampness to the wall abutting to the expansion joint, dampness was also observed and pointed out to B&R in other rooms which are away from expansion joints mainly due to the poor workmanship of brick work. A copy of Site Instruction given by our Site Engineer mentioning the room numbers of hostel where dampness was observed is enclosed.

Regarding expansion joint, it would be recalled that apprehending the ingress of water through expansion joint, we advised B&R in the several progress review meeting before monsoon to take appropriate action for treatment of the expansion joint but no proper action had been taken by them. As such B&R are responsible for dampness to the rooms abutting to the expansion joint also.

Regarding supervision of work we appreciate that supervisory staff & other officials of B&R are sincere to the work and on number of occasions they may stay back at site till late night but we pointed out that they should be more vigilant in respect of improvement of workmanship and quality of work which was pointed out to them time and again but no appreciable improvement was noticed.

In view of above and considering that the project is such a prestigious one, effort should be made by all the concerned to ensure good quality of workmanship.

We hope this would clarify the matter.

M/s. Ghosh, Bose and Associates had furnished a detailed estimate of Rs. 24.77 lakhs as has already been mentioned in the Agenda Note No. 3. It was pointed out by the Corporation Bank that (i) Rolling Shutters (ii) Security Equipments and (iii) Light fittings and fans will be supplied by the Bank. The University requested M/s. Ghosh, Bose and Associates to revise the estimate accordingly. After revision M/s Ghosh, Bose and Associates have submitted an estimate for Rs. 2755 lakhs which is more than their original estimate. The reason for increase has been explained by them saying that the earlier estimate (Rs. 24.77 lakhs) did not include the Architects fee and the fee for Project Management Consultancy. These were included in the revised estimate after it was explained to them in the Finance Committee that the Bank building stands at slightly different level in the entire project. This inclusion is intended to recover the Architects' fees and project Management Consultants' fees from the ban which would otherwise be recoverable on the entire project cost. Further the Bank had made a special request for superior quality of floors which is also included in the raised estimate. Now the estimate is as follows: -

To consider the case of Mr. Sudipto Mandal, a first-year student who has 55.9% in the overall aggregate but only 45.5% in the aggregate of the core subject including English.

Mr. Sudipto Mondal who is a student in the first-year took admission (provisional) pending publication of his 10+2 results. On publication of his 10+2 results it is found that he has obtained 55.9% in the overall aggregate but has only 45.5% in the core subjects including English.

Mr. Sudipto Mondal's father has represented to NUJS stating inter alia -

- (i) The offer letter which was issued to Mr. Sudipto Mondal merely states that he should have 50% marks in the aggregate and does not mention any thing bout core subjects.
- (ii) The Bulletin of 2002-2003 Session only mentions that a candidate must possess 50% in the aggregate of the core subjects and at least 35% in each of the core subject.
- (iii) The summary of the prospectus with admission rules does not mention that one should have 50% marks in the aggregate of core subjects. It merely states that a candidate must have 35% in each of the core subjects with 50% in the aggregate.

In view of the above, he has prayed that his son Mr. Sudipto Mondal be allowed to pursue his studies in NUJS.

Ordinarily, the Executive Council considers these matters on recommendation of the Academic Council. The Academic Council is scheduled to meet only in October 2002 by which time the present semester will come to an end. Under these extraordinary circumstances the matter is placed before the Executive Council for consideration.

Should you decide to join any other institution kindly note that you have to inform us before 20th May, 2002 and the amount will be returned to you after deducting Rs.10,000/- as institutional charges. You will forfeit the entire amount except the refundable deposits if you inform us after 20.5.2002.

The copies of certificates (not originals) to be sent with the fees are: (a) proof of age; (b) mark sheet of the qualifying examination (if result is awaited, send a declaration that you will withdraw yourself from the course forfeiting the fees etc. if you fail to submit the mark sheet with 50 percent marks in the qualifying examination before 15 August 2002); (c) character certificate from the head of the institution where you studied and (d) three copies of your photographs in passport size.

The admission will be formally completed only after an interview, which is scheduled for 28-29 May, 2002. PROSPECTUS

OBJECTS AND ORGANISATION: The West Bengal National University of Juridical Sciences Act, 1999 (Act IX of 1999) was adopted by the West Bengal Legislature in July 1999 and was published in The Calcutta Gazette of August 3, 1999. The University started functioning from November 1999 and the classes for the first batch of B.Sc/B.A. (Hons) Course commenced on 1st June 2000. It admits 80 students every year.

Among the objects of the University as stipulated under the Act are (a) advance and disseminate learning and knowledge of law and legal processes; (b) study the role of law and legal processes in national development; (c) develop a sense of responsibility in the student to serve society; (d) endeavour to make law and legal processes efficient instruments of social development; (e) promote inter-disciplinary study of law in relation to management, technology, international co-operation, etc. and (f) hold examinations and confer degrees including joint degrees in law combined with other disciplines.

SCHOOLS OF STUDIES: An academic agenda aimed at transforming legal education into justice education has to be necessarily flexible, multi-disciplinary, and innovative in its programmes and methods. To facilitate an ambitious educational programme, NUJS has organized itself into a number of Schools of Study, each independent in conception and operation, yet integrated through programmes of teaching, research and extension activities. At present the following Schools are set up in the University: The School of Criminal Justice and Administration (SCJA); The School of Technology, Law and Development (STLD); the School of Economic Laws and Governance (SELG), The School of Legal Practice and Development (SLPD) and The School of Public Law and Jurisprudence (SPLJ).

GOVERNING BODIES OF THE UNIVERSITY: According to the NUJS Act, the Chief Justice of India shall be Chancellor of the University. The authorities of the University are: the General Council, the Executive Council, the Academic Council, the Finance Committee and such other authorities as may be declared by the University to be the authorities of the University.

THE CAMPUS OF NUJS: The University which is presently housed at "Aranya Bhavan" will soon start functioning from its permanent campus at 12 LB Block in Salt Lake City on the eastern bypass road between the prestigious Science City and the Sports Stadium. Being a residential University, it has halls of residence for boys and girls admitted to various courses. Members of the teaching faculty also stay in the campus to assist the students in the management of boarding and lodging arrangements. The mess is managed by the students themselves on co-operative basis.

COURSES OFFERED: The University offers a variety of undergraduate and post-graduate courses in law and related subjects.

B.Sc./B.A., LL.B. (Hons) Degree (5 year integrated course)

- 1. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION: A candidate for admission to the B.Sc./B.A., LL.B (Hons) Degree shall have (a) passed (excepting compartmental) the Higher Secondary or equivalent Examination (10 + 2) securing in the aggregate not less than 50% of the total marks in all the core subjects and English language put together and have secured a minimum of 35% in each subject; (b) not completed 21 years of age (22 for SC/ST) as on December of the year of admission and (c) proficiency in English language.
- 2. ADMISSION PROCEDURE: The University conducts National Admission Test (NAT) on the fourth Sunday of January at such centres as it may decide. Newspaper advertisement about this will appear in early November every year. The NAT ordinarily will be of 2 hours duration mainly with objective type questions of a standard expected of a 10+2 qualified students on General Knowledge, General English and Aptitude for Legal Studies. The medium of examination is English only. The written test will be in two parts. The first part on General Knowledge/Current Affairs and General English will carry a maximum of 100 marks. The second part carrying 100 marks will test the capacity for logical reasoning and aptitude for legal studies. The result of the written test is expected to be published at the end of February and normally all admission to the University will be completed by 30 May and the teaching starts on 1st June of the year of admission.
- 3. TUITION AND OTHER FEES: The tuition fee for each year shall be Rs.35,000/- which shall be paid at the beginning of each year. The fee for foreign nationals and NRI sponsored students is US\$.3000 or its equivalent in Indian Rupees. A one-time admission fee of Rs.1000/-; fees for Campus Development, academic support service and basic hostel facilities at Rs.5000/- each per annum, refundable Library and Hostel Deposits of Rs.5,000/- each and Rs.1000/- each as Mess Deposit are to be paid by each students. These fees are subject to change. The University grants a few merit-cum-need based scholarship each year besides assisting the students for taking bank loans to pursue studies.
- 4. SUBJECTS, CREDITS AND THEIR DISTRIBUTION: The B.Sc/B.A., LL.B (Hons) Degree course will comprise 50 subjects to be studied over five years. The academic terms shall ordinarily be between June to October (Monsoon Semester) and November to March (Winter Semester). Each semester will have 5 subjects to study.

Besides the B.Sc./B.A. LL.B. (Hons) Course the University also conducts Post-Graduate Courses such as LL.M., M.Phil., LL.D (Doctor of Law) details regarding which are available in the University Bulletin.

Details about courses, evaluation scheme, attendance and class participation, project assignments, conduct and evaluation of Viva-Voce examination, end of semester written examination, result scheme, promotion scheme, award of degree etc. are available in the University Bulletin which can be obtained by sending a crossed Demand Draft for Rs.100/- drawn in favour of "NUJS" to the Registrar at the above address.

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

Despite explaining the rules in detail and signing a written agreement to attend class and appear in the examination Mr. Sabir Tarafdar failed to comply with the rule. Mr. Tarafdar has once again made a request for being readmitted to the class of 2002-2003.

This is with reference to your letter dated 16.4.2002 to the Vice-Chancellor regarding your prayer to reconsider your case to allow you to take readmission in this University which was forwarded to me

In addition to the discussion which we had with you on 13.1.2002, this is to inform you that in NUJS there is no provision for readmission per se. Questions of readmission is linked to examination and attendance. The rule relating to attendance and class participation as given in Point No.8(A) in page 20 of NUJS Bulletin 2002-03 provides that if a student does not attend any course for at least 75% of the total classes held, he shall declared as ineligible for promotion and shall not be allowed to appear in the examination. So it is very clear from this rule that a student of this University has to attend at least 75% of the total classes held to be eligible to write the examination. Moreover, the rules relating to promotion scheme, as given in point No.10(a) in page 26 of the NUJS Bulletin 2002-03 state that a student shall be eligible for promotion to the next higher class provided he has secured at least 'C' grades in all the courses offered during the year. Those who fail to secure at least 'C' grade in at least 8 out of the 10 subjects offered in a particular year shall not be promoted and shall have to seek readmission in the same year. So from this, it is also clear that if a student of the University wants to take readmission, that is only possible when he fails to get 'C' grade in at least 8 out of the 10 subjects offered in a particular year. So the question of readmission does not arise if the student does not write the examination and fails to secure



'C' grade in at least 8 out of the 10 subjects and to be eligible to write the examination the student has to attend 75% of the total classes held in that semester. Your attendance record as it appears in the NUJS Attendance Register is as follows:

Sociology – II	1 day on 14.1.02
Contact – I	1 day on 15.1.02
Economics-II	1 day on 15.1.02
Family Law – II	1 day on 15.1.02.
Political Science	No Classes attended.

As such you were not eligible to write the examination. Please recall the discussion held on 13th January 2002 in the presence of your father and two other teachers wherein this rule was clearly and repeatedly explained to you and you committed in writing that you have understood the rules and would attend classes so that you may appear in the examination, yet your attendance record is as laid out above. In our system appearance in examination is linked with attendance and without appearing in the examination one cannot seek readmission.

Considering these, University regrets to inform you that your case does not have the merit for further consideration.

Substitution of HUDCO loan of Rs. 20 crores with more beneficial loan of the same amount from Corporation Bank.

(to be read with Agenda Item No.4)

- 1. In the last Executive Council meeting it was resolved that the University should negotiate with Corporation Bank which has been allowed to open their branch at NUJS campus to take over the loan liability of the University with HUDCO for 20 crores. The Corporation Bank has just informed us that the loan is sanctioned by their Board at 11.75% PTLR repayable in 48 quarterly instalments after a repayment holiday of 2 years. In other words we will start repaying from 2004-'05 and complete by 2014-'15.
- 2. HUDCO charges us 13% interest and started taking the interest on the money borrowed from 2001 itself. Till date the University has taken 8.65 crores from HUDCO and the next instalment is due in September. By substitution of the loan with Corporation Bank which has offered favourable terms, the University will be saving substantially in the bargain.

288 lakher.

The sanction letter from Corporation Bank giving the terms and conditions is enclosed. According to the letter, University needs to do the following:

•

- (a) The State Government has to give its commitment to provide budgetary support towards the balance expenditure (as it has given to HUDCO earlier)
- (b) A "no dues certificate" from HUDCO which will be issued once the loan amount already taken is fully paid back with interest. The amount to be paid back to HUDCO may be in the range of 9 to 10 12 to 13 crores of rupees (8.65 + interest).
- (c) Legal documentation is necessary including a confirmation certificate immediately in the format provided.

3. Assuming that the documentation procedures are completed in the next few days, the HUDCO loan amount of Rs. 8.65 crores can be paid back with interest before the next instalment falls due in September, 2002. There are some penalty clauses for pre-mature re-payment of loan which are being examined. Even if it has to be paid it appears worthwhile to terminate the loan agreement early and substitute it with Corporation Bank loan.

The Executive Council may like to consider all the related issues and give necessary direction to proceed further in this regard.

Proposal for a Permanent Lok Adalat in the premises of NUJS to support clinical education of students while serving the cause of justice to the community

- O1. Professional legal education demands teaching of a variety of skills relating to interviewing and counseling, mediation and conciliation, arbitration, advocacy, legal research and documentation etc. Legal Services Clinics and clinical legal education courses are the strategies used widely for teaching of skills. Bar Council of India has prescribed four (4) such clinical (practical training) courses to be taught compulsorily.
- O2. The conventional pattern of clinical teaching is to conduct moot courts and to send batches of students to courts and law chambers for sufficiently long periods to let them observe and learn. Very little learning of skills takes place through such methods in the case of majority of students because of the difficulties of organization, supervision, evaluation and co-ordination. Hence it is proposed to "bring the Court to the Campus" through this proposal of setting up of a permanent Lok Adalat in the NUJS premises which is permissible under the recently amended Legal Services Authority Act. The Idea was informally mooted with the concerned authorities who welcomed the idea.
- 03. The proposal involves the following:
 - Allocation of two halls in the Ground Floor of the new building, one for Lok Adalat and the other for Arbitration/Conciliation proceedings properly furnished and equipped by the University.
 - (b) Allocation of part of the time of the two retired District Judges presently working on a regular basis in the faculty of NUJS to preside over the two bodies.
 - (c) Selection of distinguished retired officers (Civil Services, Judiciary, Defense Services, Police, Public Sector Units) now settled in Salt Lake area who are now associated with the

University in research and extension activities to sit in the Lok Adalat as additional members as prescribed by the Act either in an honorary capacity or by payment of appropriate honorarium by the University.

- (d) Requesting the State Government, the High Court and the State Legal Services Authority to confer the status of a permanent Lok Adalat under the Act to the NUJS set-up and notify it for information of all concerned. The rules and guidelines given by the Legal Services Authority shall be followed by the University Lok Adalat.
- (e) Provide the secretarial support necessary for the functioning of the institution out of University funds, if necessary, replenished by additional resources provided by the Government.
- (f) Allow senior students under supervision of teachers to prepare the documentation, attend to correspondence and secretarial work and extend research and administrative support for the effective functioning of the two institutions.
- (g) Allocate a small component of the annual budget of the University for clinical legal education out of which the modest administrative expenses of the Permanent Lok Adalat can be met by the University itself. The Judicial and expert members of the Adalat are any way in the pay roll of the University. The students render their services free.
- (h) Constitute a Management Board for the Legal Services Centre of NUJS consisting of the Chairman, Legal Services Authority, Judicial Secretary of West Bengal Government, the Advocate General and the Vice-Chancellor.
- 04. Once the Executive Council approves the proposal in principle, steps will be taken to contact the Government, the High Court and the Legal Services Authority to take further steps in the matter.
